OCCUPATIONAL INFORMATION

General Areas of Service:

Art is a highly stimulating, competitive, and rewarding field. It offers a variety of opportunities for qualified and assertive individuals, including positions in advertising design, graphic design, illustration, packaging, and product design. Within each of these general areas, there are numerous occupations for the person seeking employment of a more specialized nature (e.g. web design).

Professional Training:

The degrees in art offered by Pacific Union College are designed to help facilitate the student's entrance into a number of specialized fields of study and employment. The degree is looked on with favor by such prestigious art schools as Art Center College of Design. The major also enables the motivated student to develop a portfolio of professional quality, which is necessary for entering today's competitive job market in graphic design.

Denominational Service:

Adventist Health Systems, Pacific Press Publishing Association, Review and Herald Publishing Association, and Adventist colleges and universities hire students graduating with degrees in graphic design.

Job Outlook:

Statistics supplied by the United States Department of Labor indicate that Design will be one of the faster growing occupations during the next decade. It will continue to increase with the business community's emphasis on developing more innovative and specialized marketing techniques for their products and services.

Earnings:

Starting salaries vary considerably. Depending upon one's education, experience, and creative ability, earnings can range from \$31,000 - \$100,000 annually, with some incomes for art directors actually exceeding these figures.
