OCCUPATIONAL INFORMATION

General Areas of Service:

Students graduating with a degree in International Communication may find work in four international areas:

- (1) Multi-national corporations (e.g. IBM, Exxon)
- (2) Non-profit organizations (e.g. Red Cross)
- (3) Government (e.g. Voice of America, United Nations, Peace Corps)
- (4) Religious and charitable organizations (e.g. missionary).

Specifically, graduates may work as communication specialists in public relations, news and information gathering, translation, lobbying, and numerous other areas. The major is particularly attractive to those who enjoy traveling and interacting with persons of various cultures.

Professional Training:

The International Communication major requires training in three areas:

- (1) Communication skills development
- (2) Foreign language fluency
- (3) Intercultural knowledge and sensitivity

Students are encouraged to gain practical experience through the department's internship programs.

Denominational Service:

Pacific Union College was the first Seventh-day Adventist college or university to offer a degree in International Communication. This degree is particularly important given the international character of the United States and the Seventh-day Adventist church.

Job Outlook:

The job outlook is extremely bright, especially for those students having initiative, creativity and persistence in obtaining their first professional position.

Earnings:

Starting salaries are between \$22,000 and \$25,000 with experienced international communication specialists earning up to \$750,000 in administrative positions.

How to Construct Your Own Program

1. Counsel with your advisor.
2. Consider your aptitudes, interests, and available courses.
3. Schedule major courses and cognates first.
4. Fill the rest of your schedule with G.E. requirements.
5. For the freshman year include English, religion, and PE courses.
