### OCCUPATIONAL INFORMATION

#### General Areas of Service:

Art is a highly stimulating, competitive, and rewarding field. It offers a variety of opportunities for qualified and assertive individuals, including positions in studio art, illustration, and art education. Within each of these general areas, there are numerous occupations for the person seeking employment of a more specialized nature (e.g. art therapy).

#### Professional Training:

The degrees in art offered by Pacific Union College are designed to help facilitate the student's entrance into a number of specialized fields of study and employment. The B.S. degree in Fine Art is looked on as a prerequisite for entrance into a Master of Fine Arts program of study. The M.F.A. degree is in turn required for most college teaching positions in studio art and is recommended for the developing professional in the fine arts.

#### Denominational Service:

Adventist colleges and universities regularly hire graduates in studio art to teach courses in art.

#### Job Outlook:

Many studio artists go on to teach art at the college level while continuing to create works for exhibition in galleries and museums. The highly motivated individual may establish a career as a self-employed professional.

#### Earnings:

Starting salaries vary considerably. Depending upon one's education, experience, and creative ability, earnings can range from \$18,000—\$65,000 annually, with some incomes actually exceeding these figures.
