

Course Requirements

96 hours distributed as follows:

Domain 1: Religion & Humanities

Minimum, 20 quarter hours distributed as follows

► **Religion**

Take 4-8 hours of religion courses: 4-8
(4 hours required per year of attendance at a SDA College)

► **Humanities**

Take the remaining 12-16 hours from at least three of the following areas: 12-16

- Art; Music (max 4 hours of applied art and music)
- Literature; Philosophy
- History; Foreign Language.

Take 12 hours from at least two areas as follows: 12

Take one of the following physical science courses:

- CHEM 101 Introductory Chemistry (4)
- PHYS 105/106L Intro to Physics & Lab (6)

Take one biological science course:

The following courses are recommended:

- BIOL 101+102 Human Anatomy & Physiology (5+5)

Take remaining hours as needed from the following areas:

- Biology; Chemistry; Math; Physics

Noncredit algebra requirement- take one of the following: 0

- 2 years of high school Algebra with a grade of C or better (0)
- MATH 096 Basic Algebra II (4)

This course is remedial and will not count for credit.

Take a Statistics course

- STAT 222 Introduction to Statistics 4

► **Social Sciences**

Take 12 hours from at least 2 areas:

Occupational Information

General Areas of Service

Speech-language pathologists are concerned with evaluating and treating children and adults with communication disorders. Difficulties in the areas of speech, language, fluency, and voice are associated with a variety of communication disorders including: speech and language delay, hearing impairment, cleft palate, cerebral palsy, stroke, and head injury. Audiologists are concerned with prevention, identification, assessment, and rehabilitation of hearing disorders. For both professions, it is important that the student has an interest in working with people. Employment opportunities for speech-language pathologists and audiologists exist within speech and hearing clinics, public schools, hospitals, universities, health departments, skilled nursing facilities, home health agencies, rehabilitation centers, and private practice.

Professional Training

Qualifications for the profession include completion of a master's degree, specific academic and experience requirements for the Certificate of Clinical Competence awarded by the American Speech-Language Hearing Association, state licensing requirements and state credential requirements.

Job Outlook

A career in speech-language pathology is one of the best choices for this decade, with an estimated 11 percent growth in job opportunities from 2006 to 2016, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Earnings

Salaries in speech-language pathology vary depending on the professional setting, responsibilities and location. The median annual salary for beginning full-time certified speech-language pathologists was \$57,710 in May 2006.
