

Course Requirements

The following courses, as prescribed by the American Art Therapy Association, are recommended for all Pre Art Therapy students (53-55 hours). Most graduate programs require a bachelor's degree for admission into a masters program. A student may best benefit from taking either a fine art or a psychology degree, but it is not required. Students will want to consult with an academic advisor to arrange their schedules in the correct sequence.

Occupational Information

What can I do with this program?

Art therapy is a mental health profession that uses the creative process of making art to improve and enhance the physical, mental and emotional well-being of individuals of all ages. It is based on the belief that the creative process involved in artistic self-expression helps people to resolve conflicts and problems, develop interpersonal skills, manage behavior, reduce stress, increase self-esteem and self-awareness, and achieve insight.

Job Outlook

Art therapists work in a wide variety of settings, including, but not limited to, the following:

- Hospitals and clinics, both medical and psychiatric
- Outpatient mental health agencies and day treatment facilities
- Residential treatment centers
- Domestic violence and homeless shelters
- Community agencies and non-profit settings
- Schools, colleges, and universities
- Elder care facilities
- Art studios
- Private practice

An art therapist may work as part of a team that includes physicians, psychologists, nurses, mental health counselors, marriage and family therapists, rehabilitation counselors, social workers, and teachers. Together, they determine and implement a client's therapeutic goals and objectives. Other art therapists work independently and maintain private practices with children, adolescents, adults, groups, and/or families.

Earnings:

Earning for art therapists vary geographically depending on the type of practice and job responsibilities. Entry level income is approximately \$32,000, median income of \$45,000, and top earning potential for salaried administrators ranges between \$50,000 and \$100,000. Art therapists with doctoral degrees, state licensure, or who qualify in their state to conduct private practice, have an earning potential of \$75 to \$150 per hour in private practice. State requirements for private practice vary across the country, so please check with the licensing board in the state in which you plan to practice for rules and regulations.
