Continuation in and Graduation from the Program

Both the A.S. in Nursing and the B.S.N. degree include academic requirements that must be met for continuation in the program and graduation with the degree. See the current *General Catalog* for a description of these requirements.

Clinical Courses and Transportation Policies

Both the A.S. Nursing students and the B.S.N. students must meet certain requirements prior to registration for clinical courses. See the current *General Catalog* for a description of these requirements at each level.

All students are expected to provide their own transportation to, during, and from off-campus clinical labs. Faculty will not provide transportation. Students are advised not to transport clients in their own vehicles under any circumstances. This policy protects both the client and the student. State law requires proof of automobile liability insurance.

- Employ tools of critical thinking, including the nursing process, in order to solve problems and provide appropriate care.
- Provide safe, quality interventions to assist the client toward optimum health.
- Practice in a manner that is consistent with available evidence and guided by national standards.
- Communicate with all those encountered in practice in a clear, appropriate manner and with an attitude that fosters continued effective communication.
- Provide care in a manner that recognizes and respects the cultural differences among all those encountered in the practice of nursing.
- Assess, develop, implement, and evaluate a plan to meet the educational needs of individuals, groups, and communities.

- Effectively use traditional and emerging tools and technologies in the teaching and learning process.

Occupational Information

Nursing as a Career

Nursing is a career of science and service which involves assisting others with activities they would normally do for themselves. While meeting emotional, intellectual, physical, sociological and spiritual needs, nurses provide caring, safe, and informed service. Many opportunities for witnessing for God are present during this lifetime career. The ongoing demand for nurses means many jobs in diverse places with opportunities for advancement.

General Areas of Service

The individual registered nurse has freedom to work in the hospital, doctor's offices, schools, military service, mission fields, publishing houses, camps, airlines, and professional organizations. Students graduating with a baccalaureate degree in nursing find extended employment opportunities in acute healthcare as well as in settings outside the hospital. Baccalaureate nursing education prepares nurses for leadership and management roles. The baccalaureate nurse is also prepared for graduate nursing education.

Denominational Opportunities

Employment opportunities are available in Adventist Health System hospitals, home health organizations, extended care facilities and clinics. A life of service within the denominational structure is most satisfying and salaries are usually the same as community rates.

Job Outlook

Experienced nurses are in great demand. Jobs are available in rural settings or metropolitan areas on a full-time or part-time basis with flexible hours and days.

Earnings

Starting salaries for nursing graduates range from \$55,000-\$65,000 depending on geographical location.

Accreditation

The A.S. in Nursing is approved by the California BRN (Board of Registered Nursing). The A.S. and the B.S.N. in Nursing are accredited by the ACEN (Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing).
