CIRP Freshman Survey External Instrument	VP for Student Life	All incoming PUC freshmen	Every odd year during first 2 weeks of fall term. Previous: 1989-2017, 2019, 2021, 2023	Designed to provide a profile of freshmen attitudes on a range of topics including the environment, spirituality, race relations, crosscultural contact, etc. It also asks students to report on activities in which they participated during the past year, and to project about experiences in which they expect to engage while at college.

Faculty and Staff Morale Survey	Academic Administration	All faculty and staff	Annually	Designed to provide information on faculty and staff morale.	
First Destination Survey Internal Instrument	Professor for GNST 201/401	All graduating PUC students	Every quarter in GNST 201/401. First administered in 2017.	Graduating students provide information regarding their plans as they leave PUC (graduate school, employment, etc.). They also provide information regarding their participation in research and internships while at PUC.	
Graduate Exit Essay Internal Instrument	Professor for GNST 201/401	All graduating PUC students	Every quarter in GNST 201/401. Has been administered continuously since 2005.	Graduating students write essays reflecting on PUC's institutional learning outcomes (ISLOs). The essays provide qualitative feedback. Historically, the prompt has focused on the perceived effectiveness of the institution in helping them accomplish those outcomes. For the future, the essay questions will focus on student demonstration of knowledge and skills related to the outcomes.

Designed to elicit reflective opinions about a wide range of topics related to the student experience at PUC. Previous: 2008, 2011, 2013, 2015, 2019, 2022 Upcoming: 2025	Designed to measure the extent to which students engage in effective educational practices that can be linked to learning, personal development, and other outcomes such as student satisfaction, persistence, and graduation.
