President's Message

When New Seasons Bring Rejuvenation and Renewal

I guess I never thought about all the “R” words related to the concept of getting a fresh start, like a new year, a new season, or a new life opportunity. Some words that come to mind are recharge, revitalize, restore, and revive—each word holding intentional purpose for personal reflection.

Some thoughts occurred to me while I was walking through our own Mill Valley on a cool spring morning. The sights of lush green grass, dark green forests, and the smell of a multitude of flowers that surrounded me gave me a newfound sense of appreciation for the beauty that surrounds us at Pacific Union College. We are truly blessed with an amazing campus.

Yes, it is springtime, and spring break has taken most of our students away on mission trips, micro-vacations, or just to their ancestral homes for a period of renewal and rejuvenation.

As I write, I am now sitting in my office thinking about the past and the future. And of course, I am working—solving problems, answering emails, and also trying to share a glimpse into my thoughts with you. Even in the pressure-packed world of external endeavor, we all have opportunities for renewal every day and every week, if we structure our lives appropriately.

I have pondered why great professors often insert jokes and stories into their lectures. There are several good answers to this question. It may be that the story reinforces the knowledge covered in the notes or brings practical application to a complex theory. Maybe it also has to do with our minds' ability to reset, recharge, and start fresh during a break. All those years ago, your professor was giving you mini-breaks. You may have thought that the professor was only trying to entertain you, but while entertainment has its benefits in the classroom, there is ample

evidence that we often remember things better if they are at the front of a list, “Primacy Effect,” or at the end of a list, “Recency Effect.”

A 20-second or even a 60-second mind break provides the opportunity to reset the mind and start learning more robustly again. When we break the class period into more segments, there are more first and last items to absorb more effectively. After all, the average university student can only concentrate for about 15 or 20 minutes. So, a mini-break refreshes our students' concentration and helps them learn and retain more.

At PUC, we are all about providing great teaching and learning opportunities on the academic side of the ledger. We also care deeply about the physical and mental benefits of walking in the forest or taking a Sabbath day of rest. The fourth commandment uses the word “remember” (another “R” word). At PUC, we rejoice in our experiences of Sabbath rest. Our Sabbath has multiple benefits in social and spiritual dimensions. We believe it also provides better academic support for our students. With a “Sabbath” time to renew, recharge, and refresh, our students have an easier time remembering their academic studies.

If you haven't taken time to restore your mind for a while, I urge you to do so. While you are at it, spend some time reading (another “R” word). This ViewPoint magazine is a good place to start.

Albion Field

Station: *The Coastal* *PUC Experience*

Quietly nestled in the valley of an old lumber camp near the Pacific Ocean and amid forested hills, Albion Field Station lies in the heart of the Mendocino coast. Since Pacific Union College acquired the station in 1947, it has offered extraordinary opportunities for students, families, and groups to explore the beauty of the natural world and to learn more about its history, wildlife, and biology. Many proud PUC faculty, staff, and alumni have worked hard to maintain the station over the years so that people of all ages and career backgrounds can visit and enjoy what Albion has to offer, all while experiencing God’s creation firsthand. Bill Hammerland, former professor of chemistry at PUC from 1979 to 2010, expressed, “Going to Albion was always a great experience, for me and my family, and everyone. People always had a great time, and we knew it was a special place.”

Harold Clark, the PUC biology department chair at the time, had been running a summer field school studying the fauna and flora of California and their ecological relationships. The tour would last several weeks, from leaving campus, traveling to the coast, exploring the Sierras, and then returning. In the spring of 1946, Clark struck a deal after checking out all potential properties between Albion and Fort Bragg: to rent the ten acres of land for the summer of 1947 for exactly \$1, where Mendocino Biological Field Station was born. In 1952, the PUC administration voted to purchase the 10 acres for \$5,000.

From 1947 to 1989, the biology department held regular classes at Albion. For most of that period, it was hard to offer enough classes to meet the demand. In the early 80s, it became harder to get biology students to take a summer class at Albion, and the department subsequently changed its requirements so that the summer class was no longer necessary. Gibby Muth, former PUC biology department chair said, “Students wanted to come every year, it was



that much fun, because we were all together doing the same thing and enjoying it.”

Sometime in the 90s, the station’s name was shortened to Albion Field Station, which is how it is known today. When 2000 rolled around, the Friends of Albion members came together for a weekend in January and raised \$120,000 for private baths and sleeping cabins, a project that sat on hold until they obtained more funds and recruited more volunteers. The property just upriver of Albion, containing a lagoon, was purchased in 2004 for \$200,000. This purchase solved several logistical problems and was a beautiful addition to the 17.5-acre station.

Recently, there has been significant interest and movement from outside organizations interested in what Albion has to offer. In November of 2021, Moss Landing Marine Labs began research on Kelp restoration and Purple Sea Urchin Mitigation, based out of Albion Field Station. And in 2023, Sonoma State decided to research estuaries, using Albion Field Station as a base of operations, which has helped both SSU and members of Albion in their respective research projects. And beyond that, yet another

addition has been made to the premises in the form of a 5-acre gift made this past summer, which will buffer PUC from any future neighbors that would build on and occupy that property, which also includes the north half of a breathtakingly beautiful lagoon.

Albion is a special place to those who have visited, holding fond memories that will last a lifetime. Beyond the faith and mushroom retreats, birdwatching, photography, and biology classes and expeditions, the station has been a place where some have met their spouses, proposed on a canoe ride up the river, experienced a deeper spiritual connection with the Lord, and been baptized. These retreats have helped people reconnect with nature and experience the wonders of God’s creation firsthand, for both children and adults. The story of the Albion Field Station continues, serving as a peaceful and educational sanctuary for everyone to enjoy and experience one of PUC’s most remarkable gems. 🌿

The Beauty of Narrative: *Told by Sharon Fujimoto-Johnson*

With roots in Angwin, Pacific Union College was no stranger to '97 alumna and passionate children's author and illustrator, Sharon Fujimoto-Johnson, who grew up witnessing the early-morning fog over the valley, the sound of the Paulin Hall fountain, and the winding roads adorning the hill. Having been inspired by these experiences, Fujimoto-Johnson said it was during her time at PUC that she tapped into some of her most significant and creative projects, which, to her, marked the roots she is pursuing all these years later.

In her early years, she recalls writing poetry at the tender age of six, which grounded her in a love and fond appreciation for expression. She said, "The truth is that I feel most alive when I am creating, and I have circled back to that truth many times in my life so far. But really, I create in the hopes that my work will outlive me and continue to make an impact for many years. I am committed to making space for diversity, beauty, and kindness in my work."

Her family moved to Japan when she was 9, which exposed her to her cultural and familial roots, and her passion for writing grew while being homeschooled there. Fujimoto-Johnson returned to the United States a few years later to attend Rio Lindo Academy, and then continued her education at PUC, where she majored in international communication, French, and graphic design.

Being deeply involved in her love for writing, Fujimoto-Johnson maximized her five-year experience at PUC—studying abroad through Adventist Colleges Abroad in the Adventist University of France - Collonges, and editing both the yearbook and Campus Chronicle. A memory she holds

deep, all these years later, is her multidisciplinary senior honors project, in which she translated her grandmother's written biographies and tanka poems from Japanese to English, wrote a personal commentary, and compiled three handbound books for display. Since then, she has circled around books and publications for years, preparing to begin writing her own.

"Professors from the English, history, art, and honors departments supported me in mapping out and producing this project, which held the threads of work that are just now coming to fruition many years later," said Fujimoto-Johnson. "I'm so grateful for the time and space to work on this project that held such deep meaning for me in my current work."

It was at PUC that she had the opportunity to meet people who would have a lifelong impact on her, including Jeremy, her husband of almost 28 years, whom she met on campus; friends; and professors who were mentors and are now friends. Fujimoto-Johnson also reminisced about her spiritual life blossoming while on campus, as she felt grateful to have professors who allowed her to ask questions about life, God, and herself, further shaping her belief that faith is organically cultivated.

After graduating in 1997, Fujimoto-Johnson worked as an assistant editor and designer at Spectrum. These experiences instilled a deep fire in her heart to create her own books, and since then, she has been endlessly inspired by other writers and poets as she has begun to compile her own works, feeling whole as she savored the creative process.

"It is the feeling of knowing that I am doing what I was meant to do in this life. I'm deeply committed to living a creative life and to creating books that I believe should exist

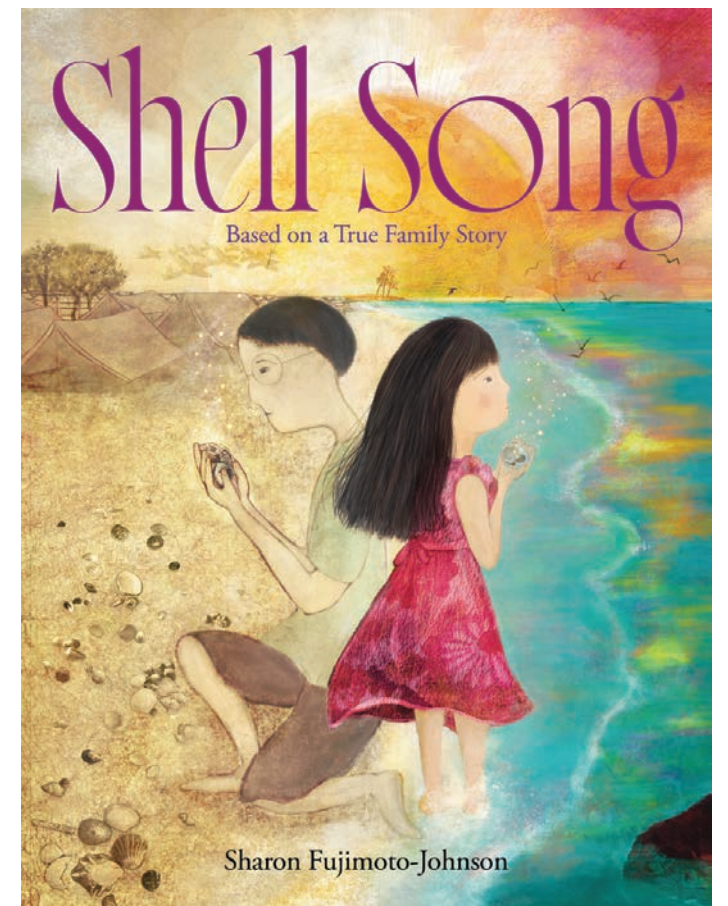
in the world. I believe that the stories we live and the stories we tell to children matter,” she passionately said. “Children need to see themselves in stories, and children need to see children who are unlike them in stories. This is the space in which empathy can grow.”

Fujimoto-Johnson believes that stories inform worldviews, life philosophies, and theologies that speak to who people are as human beings, and immersive and transformative experiences in the ways people choose to live.

One of her children's books, *Shell Song*, was inspired by her grandfather, Shigeki Fujimoto's experience in Japanese American incarceration camps in Hawai'i during WWII. At the time, he was a young and innocent husband and father who was mistaken for the enemy. Fujimoto-Johnson inherited her grandfather's shell collection and incorporated it into the book's artwork, which also features color and textures from her grandmother's wedding kimono. Her hope is to preserve and share her stories for generations to come while celebrating diversity, beauty, and kindness.

Jon Wood and Jesus for Asia Ministry

After graduating from Pacific Union College with a B.S. in psychology and an A.S. in Photography in 1987, Jon Wood began his career as a 3D Motion Graphic Artist, then returned to PUC as a professor of film and television. In 2005, the Lord impressed him to start Jesus for Asia, a missionary organization that sends missionaries to unreached areas of Asian. And now, 21 years later, the ministry has worked in over 10 countries, with nearly 1,000 workers worldwide, touching the lives of many with the good news of Jesus.

It was not easy to start a ministry, especially one of this caliber, but Wood and his wife, Natalie, also a PUC alumna, were determined, so the first thing they did was pray about how God would work and lead them as they felt called to lead others. “We spent months, actually years, praying about what that would look like, how it would be set up, what principles we would use to run it, and what project we would start with to make the biggest impact,” he said.

In the winter of 2004, Wood, along with a small team of students, traveled to Thailand around the time the Indian Tsunami hit, one of the deadliest natural disasters of this century. He ventured to India, where he filmed some of the survivors on the beach. Wood took this footage back with him, and his students edited it into a short video that was shown at the PUC Church. Immediately, \$6,000 was raised for the Adventist Development and Relief Agency. He then uploaded the video to YouTube, where he raised an additional \$2,000.

With this second donation, Wood hired five Bible workers, helped 10 families in India by purchasing food for them, sponsored an evangelistic series, baptized 35 people, and started a church. He also discovered something rather remarkable: the more he shared what was happening, the more people gave. Finally, in March of 2005, Wood tendered his resignation at PUC, where everyone sent him off in prayer and encouraged him to pursue this mission and start the ministry full-time. The ministry began as Jesus for India, but they felt called to expand the work to Thailand and Cambodia, so they changed the name to Jesus for Asia.

Many schools have been established, and plenty of evening tutoring schools with free meal services are in operation for the benefit of children and adults alike, serving an estimated half a million meals each year. Adding to this are the rather incredible testimonies from this ministry, shared by both missionaries and everyday people, describing miracles such as people being raised from the dead and healed of tuberculosis and elephantiasis. The churches planted continue to grow, and more missionaries tell their amazing stories, keeping Wood and the ministry motivated to do more.

In 2010, they launched Mission TV, a 24/7 channel that focused on the Great Commission, which encouraged viewers to share the Gospel. In 2022, an office was built in Collegedale, TN, to accommodate staff growth with the expanding work in Asia. God’s hand



was visible in every step of this process and continues to guide them as they seek new ways to spread the word.

Since he decided to pursue this mission 21 years ago, Wood has remained incredibly motivated and driven to continue the work the Lord has laid out for him. For him, seeing souls won for Christ remains the motivator. “Honestly, we’ve never been more excited than now as we see the work affecting more and more lives every year, with new projects being added that bless more and more people,” he said. “And the Word of God keeps unfolding new revelations in His grace and power.”

The work is not yet finished. There is always a need for more missionaries who feel truly called by God to serve in the good and bad times, and who are willing to go to far-off places to spread the name of Jesus to those who have not yet heard the good news.

“Anyone can do easy, but hard things build character,” said Wood. He hopes that more and more people will work hard with him and his ministry to save souls, furthering the reach of the Gospel in Asia. “There is room for many ministries in the world. Grab a map and go. You can go as a tourist first, just explore and see where the needs are and where there is a lack. Learn to trust God by reading His word and seeing what He has done in the past for His people, and know that He wants to do things like that for you! 🙌”

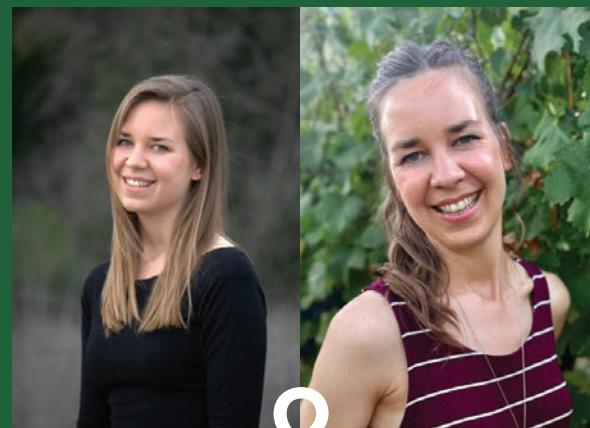

» TOUCH DOWN: CHARLIE ARRIVES AT PUC

On February 23, Pacific Union College’s aviation program’s newest addition to its fleet, affectionately known as Charlie, landed at its new home at Virgil O. Parrett Field. Many students, faculty, staff, photographers, and PUC board and community members waited in excitement for Charlie’s arrival, tracking the aircraft’s tail number on the FlightAware app and monitoring the skies.

Upon its landing, everyone warmly applauded Assistant to the Flight Center Director Andrew Hosford as he climbed out of the aircraft. Because of his experience in mechanical and avionics skills, he helped complete the refurbishment of Charlie. After receiving an airworthiness certificate, Hosford flew it home.

This Cessna 206 has faithfully served in some of the most remote and challenging corners of Papua New Guinea, Australia, and Vanuatu since it was brand new in 1976. Flight Center Director Nathan Tasker proudly shared Charlie’s story. “This was the longest-serving aircraft in the history of our church,” said Tasker. “It will have its 50th anniversary this year.”

Pointing to the colors adorning the aircraft, he continued, “The red, white, and blue color scheme is original to its factory paint, but is also painted this way because 1976 was the bicentenary celebration year of the United States. The emblem of the three angels’ message was added to the tail upon its arrival in Papua New Guinea.”

This aircraft holds a special place in Tasker’s heart, since he and his family flew on it in the 1990s while serving as missionaries in Papua New Guinea. “God has miraculously protected this special plane over many years. I am excited for how it will serve our community and inspire our pilots here at PUC. Thank you, Jesus, for this airplane,” said Tasker.

At PUC, this technically advanced aircraft will be used for commercial pilot flying, per the program’s 10-hour flight requirement, and to teach bush flying techniques. The aviation program is incredibly grateful to those who have donated to bring Charlie home, but it still needs \$81,245.09 to cover the balance. 🙌

» JORDAN DELARMENTE: CHRIST-CENTERED SERVICE IN THE MILITARY

Driven by his passion for service, Pacific Union College alumnus Jordan Delarmente was inspired by his time on campus to redefine the essence of worship and to be a light to people in a dark place, even in the heart of deployment overseas.

After graduating in 2017 with a bachelor’s degree in marketing communications and an associate degree in health science, Delarmente immediately began working in healthcare for six months in San Jose, CA. However, he has always felt a deep calling to serve in the military because his great-grandfather served in WW2 and survived the Bataan Death March, which gave his family the opportunity to come to the United States.

Delarmente will have been in the National Army Guard for eight years this year and currently serves in operations and logistics, supporting hundreds of troops throughout the Middle East. When he is not deployed or working weekends, Delarmente works for the U.S. Air Force as a Nuclear Test Equipment Manager, supervising technical aspects of nuclear-related testing environments.

His family highly values Adventist education that equips them with the skills for a service-oriented career, which is why they sent him to PUC. Delarmente passionately stated that PUC prepared him to take on the military, especially in his logistics and operations roles. Not only did he feel equipped to take on a service position in the real world, but to cherish day-to-day connections, building, fostering, and creating relationships with everyone he came across. He attests that people gravitate towards him because he embodies the joy, light, and love of Jesus.

“PUC’s rigid curriculum, opportunities to work and help pay for school, and the volunteer work taught me the importance of planning and scheduling. PUC also taught me the importance of leaning on God because, for instance, there were many times I was unsure how I was going to pay for school; however, God always opened a door,” he said.

Along with his grandfather, he looks up to his father, who served for 20 years in the United States Air Force, and the 60+ soldiers that he serves as a direct line leader. He maintains a vision to create a solid foundation for his future family and to continue to make his parents proud, since he is the first commissioned officer in his family’s bloodline.

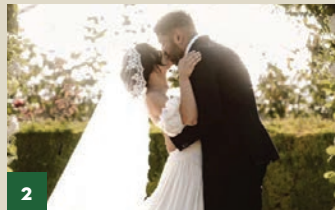

New Life from an Old Grave

My shoe strikes something hard and flat in the ashen dirt. I kick crushed leaves aside, then brush the dirt away. It's not him. A family of deer watches through the mid-morning chill as we disrupt their tranquil cemetery, inspecting headstones. "W. S. Kellogg." Closer. "Francis Elizabeth Kellogg." Still no "Merritt Gardner Kellogg."

I've been after this grave for three years. Some say it's lost to history. A year ago, I found an obituary listing Oak Mound Cemetery in Healdsburg, CA, but the office said, "No card on file for a Merritt Kellogg."

Why does Merritt matter to me? It's not about corn flakes or John Harvey Kellogg. He matters because his gritty voice was the first to preach my Adventist faith in California—and he spent half a century expanding its reach. He was a pioneer. We need pioneers.

The story begins with a 26-year-old Merritt heading west with his wife and three kids. Before leaving Jackson, MI, he bought two pairs of new shoes. As he walked beside his oxen, the wooden pegs holding the soles on his shoes fell out, one by one. He walked hundreds of miles barefoot, but he reached California.

That pioneering spirit ran in his family. His father ran a station on the Underground Railroad. His stepmother, Ann Stanley, took on five stepchildren at 18 and turned their fortunes around. In 1859, Merritt, Louisa, and their three kids reached San Francisco, where he shared his faith in the fading glint of the Gold Rush.

It feels personal to me. Merritt preached my Adventist faith in the same region where I now train Adventist preachers. That stirs me deeply. It's a big part of my drive to find his grave.

I look up from my work to check in with my daughter, Kara, and my brother, Lonnie. They offered to help me try this again this Sabbath morning. "Find anything yet?" They shake their heads. I climb over a fallen oak, peer through gnarled branches, then clamber deeper into the woods toward more collapsed monuments. Maybe he bought a hilltop plot. Maybe Adventist frugality meant a simple

stone. I steady myself on the uneven hillside to peel back layers on another buried headstone.

When they came west, the movement was so new it had no name yet. Merritt was a farmer turned carpenter, but when he preached, 14 people accepted the Adventist message. For seven years, he urged Battle Creek leaders to send evangelists. Eventually, the Loughboroughs and Bourdeaus came. Even with help, Merritt didn't slow down. He redoubled his mission work. Over five decades, he started churches, built hospitals, served as a doctor on the missionary ship Pitcairn, and more.

"Hey, guys, I found something," Lonnie calls. It is a tiny white stone that reads, "M. G. K. 1833-1921." Close. Maybe close enough.

I waited until Monday to call the caretaker at the cemetery. I give Sarah the grave's location, and she promises to call back with excitement in her voice: "You found it!"

There's a card in the catalog now, and we dedicated a new headstone with Merritt's name on it in November 2025.

Does it matter? It feels like it does. I think God helped us find it. Why? I believe God wants us to remember that Merritt's mission, our mission, still matters. 🌿



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
