Studying Scripture:

Complete an elective course from RELB, RELH, RELP, or RELT. It is recommended that the course be selected from the options listed under sections B or D of the baccalaureate religion GE requirement.

Exploring SDA Life and Thought:

- One approved course that explores and critically analyzes Seventh-day Adventist beliefs & values. Approved options are listed in the class schedule with the letter "C" in the section designation.
- Include elective religion coursework if needed

A portion of the religion requirement may be waived for students who transfer a significant amount of coursework from non-Adventist colleges and universities. Contact the Records Office for details.

 Other options are available and are listed in the class schedule with the letter "D" in the section designation.
