Occupational Information

Emergency Management is the managerial function charged with creating the framework within which communities and organizations reduce vulnerability to hazards and cope with disasters. The bachelor's degree prepares students for management jobs at the local, state, and federal level in settings such as emergency management, firefighting, emergency medical services, law enforcement, disaster relief, as well as business continuity opportunities in private business.”

The degree in Emergency Management offered by Pacific Union College is designed to prepare the student for a career in emergency management.

Statistics supplied by the United States Department of Labor indicates that employment of emergency managers is expected to grow by 7% through 2028.

According to the US Bureau of Labor and Statistics Emergency Managers receive a median annual income of \$75,000 plus benefits.

How to Construct Your Own Program

1. Counsel with your advisor.
2. Consider your aptitudes, interests, and available courses.
3. Schedule major courses and cognates first.
4. Fill the rest of your schedule with G.E. requirements.
5. For the freshman year include English, Religion, and PE courses. Also include Basic Algebra I+II unless waived by previous work.
