

Program Structure and Requirements

The California SB2042 Preliminary Single Subject Teaching Credential can be earned as part of the undergraduate program, as a post-baccalaureate non-degree program, or as a Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.) program. Students may also earn the SDA Basic Secondary certificate while completing the M.A.T. Students should consult with the credential analyst to determine the appropriate program for their needs.

This guidesheet describes the M.A.T. program, which results in a teacher certification as well as a degree. Students interested in the undergraduate program or the post-baccalaureate non-degree program should refer to page EDUC-06.

Prerequisites for Admission

Candidates must be formally admitted to the program before they will be admitted to methods courses or field experiences.

► **Prerequisites for all applicants**

1. Complete EDUC 101 Introduction to Teaching and EDUC 101L Classroom Observations.
2. Demonstrate basic skills by passing the CBEST.
3. Demonstrate subject matter competency by passing the CSET, in the selected content area.
4. Obtain a Certificate of Clearance from the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing to verify criminal record clearance.
5. Submit official documentation demonstrating completion of a four-year bachelor's degree from a regionally-accredited institution of higher education.
6. Demonstrate a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0.
7. Submit the complete program application as follows:
 - a) Application form
 - b) Advisor Interview
 - c) Personal Statement
 - d) Recommendation
 - e) Official transcripts for all college work
 - f) Basic Skills verification
 - g) Certificate of Clearance (criminal record check)
 - h) CSET score report
 - i) SDA church membership verification (if a SDA member)
8. Complete the admissions interview with the Credential Analyst.

Requirements for Graduation with the M.A.T.

To receive the M.A.T. with the Single-Subject specialization, students must meet the following requirements:

1. Complete the program coursework (46 credits) for the M.A.T. All courses must be completed at the graduate level. Exception: One undergraduate course may be transferred in to the Basic Core section.
3. Demonstrate a minimum overall graduate GPA of 3.0 with no grade lower than B-.
4. Successfully submit and present the California Teaching Performance Expectations (TPEs) portfolio to the faculty and other educators.

 Pass the CSET (completed for M.A.T. program admission)
 Pass the CALTPA- California Teaching Performance Assessment

Requirements for the Teaching Credential

To be recommended for the California SB2042 Preliminary Single Subject Teaching Credential, candidates must hold a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution, and have completed satisfactorily all the course work, field work, and examinations as listed.

Requirements for SDA Certification

To be recommended for the SDA Basic Secondary certificate, candidates must complete the following additional requirements: 16 hours of religion coursework, including RELT 205 or 220, RELH 360, and 3 hours of RELB coursework
 EDUC 568+L K-12 Bible & Practicum (*recommended but not required for the SDA Basic Secondary certificate.*)

These SDA requirements are not part of the M.A.T. degree, but may be completed concurrently or transferred in from the bachelor's degree program.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students can:

- Engage and support all students in learning.
- Create and maintain effective environments for student learning.
- Understand and organize subject matter for student learning.
- Plan instruction and design learning experiences for all students.
- Assess student learning.
- Develop as a professional educator.
- Integrate faith and learning (SDA credential candidates only).
- Conduct academic research.*
- Demonstrate educational leadership.*

* Denotes learning outcomes for the MAT that are differentiated from the credential program.

Occupational Information

What can I do with this program?

Candidates who complete the single-subject credential program become middle or high school teachers. The M.A.T. can also qualify candidates for more advanced-level positions within schools.

Additional Education Required?

Holders of CA preliminary teaching credentials are expected to complete a state-approved Teacher Induction to maintain and upgrade their credentials.

The M.A.T. is a terminal degree and does not provide a foundation for further graduate study in a doctoral program.

Public Sector vs. Denominational?

Candidates can find employment in SDA, public, or private schools.

Job Outlook

The job outlook for teachers is excellent as the demand for teachers is expected to increase. The Education Department provides a placement service that assists candidate's entry into the teaching profession. Part of this service includes arranging for interviews with prospective employers during the program.

Scholarships

The Adventist Mission Scholarship is available to incoming freshman and transfer students to earning an SDA teaching credential. A variety of additional scholarships are available to credential candidates during their final quarter of student teaching. Students interested in public school employment may inquire about the Golden State Teacher Grant Program.

Prerequisites for Full-Time Student Teaching

Candidates must meet extensive prerequisites prior to participation in the full-time student teaching experience. Please consult with the Credential Analyst for additional information.

Restrictions on Transfer Coursework

A maximum of one methods course without fieldwork may be taken by correspondence or directed study if approved by the department. Methods courses with fieldwork may not be taken by correspondence or directed study. Methods courses with fieldwork being transferred will require the fieldwork to be completed at Pacific Union College.
