The Pacific Union College EMT-P (Emergency Medical Technician - Paramedic) to Registered Nurse (RN) Program is taught at the Napa campus and is uniquely designed to enable students to work full time while continuing their nursing education.

EMT-P to RN Orientation and Bridge Course:

- Orientation: August 29, 2022
- The EMT-P to RN Bridge Course (NURS 213) is scheduled for Fall 2022 Meets seven full 8-hour days:
 - two days in September
 - two days in October
 - three days in November
- EMT-P students are required to pass the Assessment Technology Institute PN Comprehensive Exam at a predetermined standardized level (currently 71.3% or above) during the EMT-P to RN Bridge Course to start the nursing curriculum
- After successfully completing the EMT-P to RN Bridge Course, students will join the advanced-placement LVN/Med-Tech to RN cohort of 18 students for the first of three nursing sessions
- Nursing curriculum (session one) starts January 29, 2023

EMT-P to RN Program Length

- 18 months total after completion of EMT-P to RN Bridge Course.
- Three 17-week sessions are extended over the 18-month program.
- Generous breaks between the three sessions facilitate students' preparation for the next session and accommodate personal obligations.
- Theory is taught during three coreweeks; coreweeks are four consecutive 8-hour days (normally Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday) evenly spaced throughout the 17-week session.
- 12-hour clinical labs are scheduled on non-coreweek Sundays during the session.

EMT-P to RN Program Format:

- Non-traditional format for the working adult.
- Adult education principles are the foundation of the program, which is structured to allow students to meet other life obligations while developing the knowledge, skills, and attitudes of the professional RN.

Admission:

- Acceptance into the EMT-P to RN program is competitive and based on a combination of academic achievements, admission test results, and personal qualifications.
- Must be a licensed paramedic.
- Completion of not less than 16 college quarter hours of nursing cognate and/or general education courses are required prior to the start of the program.
- Intro to Chemistry, Human Anatomy, Human Physiology, and Microbiology are prerequisite to starting the nursing curriculum. Courses can be concurrently taken during the Bridge Course.
- There is no expiration for previously taken college courses.

EMT-P to RN Associate of Science Degree Requirements

The following cognate and general courses are required for the EMT-P to RN degree at PUC. All science courses are prerequisites that <u>must</u> be completed prior to starting the nursing curriculum.

Admission into the EMT-P to RN program is competitive in nature. Therefore, evaluation of one's nursing GPA (in the cognate/general courses listed below), test scores, and the number of completed required cognate/general courses will affect the likelihood of being accepted into the program.

Transfer nursing credit of 22 hours is granted from accredited vocational colleges for the first year of traditional AS in Nursing degree courses to EMT-P applicants who have passed the Assessment Technology Institute (ATI) PN Comprehensive exam at a predetermined standardized level set by national norms (currently at 71.3%). The EMT-P to RN AS in Nursing degree includes 41 hours of major course work taken through PUC. A total of 115 hours minimum are required for the degree (major courses, cognate courses, and general education courses).

Students may earn a maximum of 24 hours of academic credit by the successful writing of AP (Advanced Placement), IB (International Baccalaureate), CLEP (College Level Examination Program), DDST (DANTES Subject Standardized Tests) and/or Excelsior examinations for the AS Nursing degree. Only grades of C or higher are accepted for transfer and while completing the nursing program.
