

If you ask me what I got for Christmas this year, I'll probably stare blankly for a while, eventually raise one eyebrow, and maybe come up with a couple items after twenty minutes.

That's not because I didn't get any good gifts. On the contrary, I'm quite sure they were lovely, unique, and given with sincerity (sigh...if only I could remember them!). The truth of the matter is that objects sort of slip through my memory like spaghetti noodles through oversized strainer holes.

College life is some of the richest time, packed with opportunity, direction, fun, discovery, and new ideas that will impact students' lives indefinitely. Offering someone the chance for that experience is a pretty impressive gift. This is most apparent when people give to or establish scholarships, directly giving students the resources that make college possible on an individual level. But even when the route is giving to a project or the general fund, the gifts find their way into a very real network of support that reaches into innumerable aspects of students' experiences. *A Growing Vision:*

**PUC Considers Its Future**



**In the midst of a year-long celebration of our 125th anniversary, Pacific Union College is turning eager eyes to the future. The college has invested years in research, honest assessment of strengths and needs, and the vision for an ongoing learning community. As these elements come together into a concrete opportunity for growth, the college's future takes on new depth and possibility.**

This opportunity is the Eco-Village project, an innovative plan that offers a chance to develop and emphasize the unique characteristics of campus and community. Angwin's identity has long been as a small, semi-rural college town. The community dynamics have changed over the years, but locals still place high value on the tree-lined hills and the quiet style of the village. Likewise, PUC was established on principles of stewardship, the value of nature, and a peaceful location. So as the college looked into ways of utilizing its land resources to build its endowment and ensure a strong future, the opportunity to pursue an ecologically friendly development plan brought new life to the campus vision.

"The Eco-Village concept reflects the healthy lifestyle principals and goals which form the foundation of our faith-based college," says PUC president Richard Osborn. "This small project represents a one-of-a-kind opportunity to create a community with an unparalleled commitment to sustainability, social equity and environmental preservation."

The background need for such a project lies in the changing world of higher education. It's no secret that

colleges exist in an increasingly competitive environment and face rising tuition rates, changing demographics, and increasing expenses. Academic institutions are finding that the solution is a healthy endowment—and PUC's opportunity to establish such a support system has been a matter of much discussion.

In 2002, the PUC Board of Trustees appointed an asset management taskforce to begin examining options for developing a portion of the college property in the effort to grow our endowment. After years of research, in June 2006, the Board unanimously voted to work with Triad Communities, L.P., in pursuing the possibility of a sustainable community. (ViewPoint, Fall 2006)

"The Trustees have a commitment to fulfill their moral and legal obligations by using college-owned land in an economically and environmentally responsible way to ensure the future of this institution," says Thomas J. Mostert Jr., president of the Pacific Union College Board of Trustees.

Six months later, Triad and PUC unveiled preliminary concepts for the Angwin Eco-Village and ideas for the campus Master Plan (an independent process completed by another company and funded by PUC). Then, in response to research, public meetings and feedback on preliminary plans, Triad and PUC went through an on-going process of refining and revising the original design.

The recent version of the plan includes a smaller housing proposal, 391 units in total. The plan maintains the original emphasis on sustainability and community and takes into account needs in such areas as private and public schools, traffic circulation and safety.

On the following pages, *ViewPoint* outlines the current concepts and vision for the Eco-Village and takes a look at what's in store for the future of PUC.

### *Angwin Eco-Village at a Glance*

PUC's vision is to help create a community that is intentionally designed for living with elegant simplicity, balancing jobs and housing, and incorporating more efficient, earth-friendly technologies. A carefully planned and environmentally sensitive "Eco-Village" will respect the semi-rural character of Angwin and PUC's spiritual and physical environment.

- **Land Preservation.** Over 90 percent of our land will be protected as forest, open space, parks, and agricultural land. Less than 10 percent, including campus area, will be developed with educational, residential and commercial structures. PUC is also committed to the ongoing operation of the airport, and the Eco-Village will have no impact on airport operations.

- **Community Agriculture.** Agricultural land will produce a variety of crops as a fundamental part of the village, through the auspices of the Angwin Agriculture Conservancy, creating a viable business for local families and wholesome, organically grown food. Seventy acres will be dedicated to locally grown food.
- **Protecting Open Space.** In addition to existing open space (most of which will be protected through conservation easements), public parks and open spaces will be added to the new neighborhoods.
- **A “Walkable” Angwin and Campus.** Relocation and consolidation of parking, redesign of campus streets, addition of walking and biking paths and park areas, improved traffic circulation, and the availability of more services in Angwin will contribute to lessen traffic congestion and provide safer streets for pedestrians.
- **Water Conservation and Better Waste Disposal.** Secure, reliable water supplies, water-saving measures, and better waste disposal systems are important elements of the project.
- **Designs retain a village setting.** The revised proposal consists of a total of 391 housing units sited on land designated for planned development and includes single-family housing, cottages, townhouses and flats. A significant number of these units will be on-campus housing for PUC faculty and staff. Thirty-five percent of the total Eco-Village/PUC housing units will be high-quality affordable and workforce housing for local families, PUC faculty and staff, and St. Helena Hospital employees.
- **A Community Gathering Place.** 87 percent of Angwin residents and PUC students will be within a 15-minute walk of the Village Square, a retail area centered around a 1.5-acre commons where people can sit and relax.

### *How an Increased Endowment Can Help PUC:*

#### **1. Provide scholarships for students**

Hundreds of deserving students will be able realize their dream of an Adventist education.

#### **2. Increase faculty and staff salaries**

By offering competitive salaries, PUC will be able to recruit and retain quality educators, thereby maintaining academic excellence.

#### **3. Create more college housing for employees**

The goal is to build more housing options for college employees, helping PUC to overcome one of its biggest hurdles for faculty and staff recruitment.

#### **4. Generate funds for campus renovations**

As the campus approaches its 100th year in Angwin, deteriorating campus facilities will receive much-needed renovations.

#### **5. Construct new buildings for PUC**

The college has campaigned for an administrative building and a library; an endowment will get us on the road to reaching these and additional goals.

## *Frequently Asked Questions*

### **How did we decide to work with Triad?**

Five years ago, the PUC Board of Trustees appointed an Asset Management Taskforce to look at how we might transform some of our non-income producing assets (land) into assets that will produce ongoing income for the college. After examining a number of options, in late 2005 the board came up with the vision to create sustainable development that will provide for the needs of not only PUC but also the Angwin community. PUC then contacted Triad Communities, Inc., and asked them to create a proposal that implements the board's vision.

### **What is the difference between the Eco-Village and PUC's Campus Master Plan?**

The Eco-Village plan deals with lands that PUC plans to sell. The college hired SWA Group (award-winning planners who have worked with Stanford University and University of California, Berkeley) to create a Campus Master Plan. The master plan looks at future growth by planning ahead for new buildings and campus renovations. The master planning process parallels our current efforts with Triad, and while there is some collaboration between the two, they are two separate projects.

### **How will the natural beauty surrounding PUC be preserved?**

The planners have committed to preserving 90 percent of the lands included in forestland, agriculture, open space, and parks. Most of PUC's beloved hiking and biking trails will also be preserved and new ones created through careful planning that only allows for very minimal development in the back woods on existing agricultural parcels already zoned by the county for one home each. Also, PUC will retain ownership of over 700 acres of the forest east of the airport.

### **What is an endowment and how will it help?**

An endowment is an amount of money that is invested with the stipulation that the principal remain intact and only the interest be spent. With the principal protected, the endowment produces a steady income for the college year after year. PUC's goal is to put the money earned from the Eco-Village project into an endowment. Currently, PUC's endowment is about \$12,452 per student with much of it in specific scholarships for students, academic departments, or faculty development. Some professional organizations recommend an endowment of about \$92,000 students for a college of our size. (For more about endowments, read the president's message on page 31.)

## Theater Comes to Stauffer

Back when Stauffer Hall was known as Paulin Hall and housed the music department, a small auditorium was located upstairs, its stage and high ceiling infused with years of music. More recently, offices were built over part of the stage, and the remaining space served as a class and conference room for the English department and for some years as a test-taking space for the Counseling Center.

Now the 75-year-old room has entered a new phase—as a small theater. The office walls on the stage were torn down and the motley assortment of chairs, whiteboards and shelves was carted out. The tired white of the walls gave way to violet primer, followed by rich coats of elegant crimson paint. The high ceiling with its massive dark beams and the many windows with their small panes and topped with arching yellow glass perfectly complement this new look.

The theater provides the drama program with a much-needed “sacred space” that’s dedicated to their needs. The theater is small, but the department will work with that. “With a smaller space you can do things that are a little edgier, you can take risks,” explains drama program director Mei Ann Teo. Students have an opportunity to do performances that wouldn’t necessarily work well in one of the larger auditoriums on campus. “This is the first phase,” says Teo. “But I think it is going to serve us very well for the next few years.”

“We’re so lucky to be getting at least part of our dream,” says Marilyn Glaim, chair of the English department. “We still hope for a 150-seat ‘real’ theater someday, but for now we’re going to make good use of this.”

Because a large gift from a professor emerita allowed work to begin on this dream project, it has been named the Alice Holst Theater in her honor. Holst has been in Angwin since 1948. She taught in and was chair of the

secretarial science department. “All my life has been young people,” says Holst. “I was concerned that students were going off campus to do things that should be done on campus—not only to perform but also to see performances. It seemed to me that it would be better if we could have the resources and drama on campus. The more we can do on campus, the more students will feel like it’s home.”

Still, there’s much to do. “We have a long way to go,” says Teo, listing technology needs and improvements for the rehearsal space. “I want to emphasize how generous people have been,” she says. “And that we need more to be able to do powerful things and grow the program.”

The space will be used for the classes, rehearsals, and performances of the drama program, but also for other classes, student performances, and possibly a film viewing location for the film & television program. “We hope it becomes a real center for artistic pursuits,” says Glaim.

Teo has been inspired by the support Glaim and Nancy Lecourt, current academic dean and previous English department chair, have shown for the project. “They could see how good it was for students to have a space, to have ownership, and for the school to have ownership over

a drama program,” explains Teo.

The first performance in the new theater took place in March and was an original collaborative work called “Red Books: Our Search for Ellen White”. The cast did extensive research and interviewing for the project, and Teo worked with two students to write and produce this ambitious work, which explores the impact and relationship of Ellen White to the Seventh-day Adventist church through the years. Teo was delighted to see this project as the kick-off for the theatre. “It’s special to do such an ambitious work that’s about community. I think it’s really serendipity...”

## Salvation Coach: A Podcast for Your Soul

Not long after PUC chaplain Roy Ice started his new podcast, *Salvation Coach*, Apple contacted him to ask about it. The program, which provides “a workout for your soul,” had apparently seen such a huge spike in usage—unusual for podcasts—that Apple wondered whether they should shift bandwidth in order to adequately meet the need of Ice’s online ministry.

It’s a project that is obviously fulfilling a need. Ice, a pastor and teacher for the last 13 years, started *Salvation Coach* because he observed a need for a spiritual podcast that specifically talks to young people about how to connect with God. “We have on-demand TV, on-demand music,” Ice explains. “Today we have to have on-demand ministry.” Each episode addresses issues facing contemporary Christians in real life. His first set of programs, “Twelve Things to Try While You’re Still Mortal,” which is also the title of Ice’s new book, features topics such as forgiveness and avoiding “get spiritual quick” diets.

Pastor Ice sees a need for people today, especially young people, to find relevance and realness in their Christianity: “I think this generation is finally coming to the question—and they’re brazen and bold and released enough by the previous generation to ask the question—is it real?”



## Ring Tones Around Campus

It wasn’t long ago when frustrated cell phone users would congregate at certain points on campus, straining their ears to hear the jumbled words of the person on the other end, all the while shouting into their phone, “Can you hear me now?!” The walk around campus seemed like a perpetual advertisement for Verizon, the wireless carrier to which the infamous slogan can be attributed. However, somebody at the company must have heard the plea for adequate reception because on November 3, 2006, Verizon completed construction of an antenna located behind Nichol Hall.

While the process that ultimately brought the antenna to Angwin was lengthy, the benefits of reliable and consistent service have brought a sense of ease and convenience to the community. Social, business and emergency calls can now be made without having to travel to deserted parking lots at odd hours of the night. The agreement to install the antenna, which was signed in the summer of 2005, was partially spurred on by the need for reliable access to emergency services. “The local Sheriff’s Department had identified a lack of coverage in the area and had contacted Verizon Wireless about adding a cell site to improve wireless communication for emergency services,” says Heidi Flato, manager of public relations and employee communications for Verizon.

The down side, of course, is that teachers now have to face the cell phone music in class—a common enough occurrence on most college campuses, but a new experience for PUC!

## Campus Artists Present Recent Work

PUC's visual arts faculty hosted their annual art exhibition in the Rasmussen Art Gallery from January 13 to February 8. The show, open to the public, displayed a diverse collection of media. Oil paintings, photographs, graphic design, and even a documentary were all part of the exhibit that welcomed an equally diverse mix of students, faculty and community visitors.

The exhibition featured the work of 11 faculty and staff artists, including a series of multi-media collages by Thomas Morphis that explored the existence of struggle in life, and a series of photos by Tom Turner documenting the construction of the new photography lab in Fisher Hall.

The visual arts department offers majors in fine art, photography, graphic design, and film and television; and minors in art history and art. It is one of the most popular departments on campus, with nearly 100 students enrolled in various programs.

## Faculty Biologist Pursues Cancer Research

Husbands, sisters, mothers, fathers, friends. These are only some of the people lost to cancer on a daily basis. Statistically speaking, everyone has been or will be touched by the destructive and prevalent disease, a disease that invades our lives and our bodies yet remains without a cure.

While the world continues its search for a cure, a great deal of research has moved towards the preventative aspect. Dr. Brian Y. Y. Wong, a biology professor new to PUC this academic year, has been researching and testing various methods of cancer prevention during the past 16 years. Since his doctoral dissertation in 1990, Wong has researched the effectiveness of Chinese herbs in combating, or at least slowing, the growth of cancer cells. Two of these herbs, which have shown promising lab results, are found commonly throughout China in roadside ditches. Testing performed on mice has yielded delayed cancer cell growth of up to five or six weeks when taking certain levels and combinations of the herbs, which is the equivalent of about seven years for humans.

Part of Wong's inspiration comes purely from the fact that cancer affects people in so many different ways. In China and Africa, mold grown on peanuts used to make peanut butter has been found to cause liver and intestinal cancer. "I want to find a scientific basis using scientific processes to publish articles in peer journals, which will attract more people to the herbs," says Wong. His presentations at cancer research conventions in Phoenix, Lincoln and Washington D.C. offer an insight to the importance of Wong's findings. His latest presentation took place this past December at the Innovations for Prostate Cancer Research conference in San Francisco, an event hosted by the American Association for Cancer Research.

In spite of a heavy schedule, which finds him in either the classroom or the lab during most of the day, Wong manages to set aside time to continue his research at PUC. The mice, which were brought to California from Union College in

Nebraska this past summer, are housed in a room sterilized and prepared specifically for his research. Wong also capitalizes on a tradition of using students as his research assistants. This involvement of students in his research serves several purposes. Not only does it allow Wong to balance his time between the classroom and the lab, but it also gives students the experience of working on an ongoing project and having their work published. Working on advanced equipment like a microplate reader, which Wong hopes will be coming soon to PUC, further offers students the type of experience that is usually reserved for those working in the laboratories of large-scale corporations.

The positive results of Wong's studies and research provide him with the motivation to continue studies on the two Chinese herbs; and while some scientists clamor for recognition and the opportunity to establish their names in the world of preventative research, he finds satisfaction solely in his contribution to the field. "As Adventists, we have a health message and believe that prevention of sickness and disease is the best way," says Wong. "Prevention is still my goal."

## Deferred Rewards

Now that you've graduated and have been working for a few years, you're probably wondering how to build a source of stable income for the future. This can be especially challenging to do in light of a volatile stock market, financial uncertainty and restrictions on tax benefits of individual retirement plans. As you consider your options, you may want to include a Deferred Payment Charitable Gift Annuity as part of the solution. This plan has four benefits you won't find in other retirement plans:

- A charitable income tax deduction
- Partial bypass of capital gains tax on appreciated stock
- Partly tax-free income
- A gift to charity

Let me explain a little. A Deferred Payment Gift Annuity is a contract in which you exchange cash or securities for a fixed income for life, starting in a year you designate (usually the year you expect to retire).

How does this help you today? A large part of what you transfer represents an important gift for our future, which translates into a sizable charitable deduction. Plus, this deduction may offset the capital gains tax on appreciated assets such as securities or real estate.

Members of the "baby boomer" generation may find Deferred Gift Annuities to be the perfect way to assist our programs and also supplement their IRA, 401(k) or other retirement savings plans. For

example, if a person age 45 arranges a \$10,000 Deferred Payment Gift Annuity today, with payments to begin at age 65, she can deduct about \$5,000 as a charitable deduction, and we would agree to pay her \$1,650 per year for life.

You might ask, "What if I can't pinpoint the exact year I need the payments to begin?" A new planning option allows you to simply make a ballpark estimate of when the first check should be sent. You won't be locked in to that date. However, the longer you wait to begin payments, the larger those payments will be.

So the next time you're thinking about retirement planning, be sure to add Deferred Payment Charitable Gift Annuities to your list of possibilities.

## CORRECTION

The winter 2007 *ViewPoint* stated the following: By making a donation from your IRA, not only will 100 percent of the pretax amount benefit the organization, it will also deduct the full amount from your adjusted gross income for that year.

This statement should be clarified as follows: By making a donation from your IRA, 100 percent of the pretax amount will benefit the organization. It will not be included in your adjusted gross income for the year, so you will not be taxed on that amount; but neither will it be deductible.

## A Family Away from Home

Lidia Dima, a nursing student who comes from Romania, has wanted to be a nurse ever since she was baptized into the Adventist church at the age of 18. She has long dreamed of returning to her village, Banesti, to build a church.

## Carrying on the Mentorship

Although he is only a junior, Nathaniel Gamble, majoring in religion with an emphasis in church history and theology, has already taught several class periods in the religion department. He is convinced that he would enjoy teaching as a career. Several of his professors have encouraged Nathaniel to pursue this interest, and he says he wants to carry on their legacy of mentorship by "helping students to find out their dreams."

So with plenty of school to go, he can use as many scholarships as he can get—and he is well on his way. The religion department awarded him the Mae and Paul Quimby scholarship for this year in recognition of his academic pursuits. The money he received pushes him closer to becoming a college or seminary professor.

In addition to teaching, Nathaniel is passionate about research. He credits this passion with giving him the opportunity for the scholarship. Last year, he wrote a 19-page (single-spaced) paper on the doctrine of original sin in Romans 5:12. He was invited to present the paper at a meeting of the Adventist Society for Religious Studies, at which only graduate papers are typically presented. As a result of that paper, the PUC religion department also selected Nathaniel to receive the 2005-2006 Zondervan Greek Award for excellence in New Testament Greek.

Nathaniel says he appreciates the scholarships he has received: "They help because I am a poor college student, and they will look good on my resume when I apply to grad school!" In addition to the influence of his professors, Nathaniel believes that off-campus supporters are crucial to the PUC experience. He recognizes the alumni touch on campus. "I'm very grateful they've been helping defer our costs," he says. "They're always trying to provide opportunities for students that would cost a fortune."

John Osio, a music education major, made the decision to come to PUC during a College Days event on campus his senior year of high school. "It was the environment and people that convinced me to go to PUC," he says.

His ongoing involvement in music and encouragement from high school music teachers influenced his decision to pursue a career in music. # president's message



## GROWING PUC'S ENDOWMENT | by Richard C. Osborn

Throughout its illustrious history, Pacific Union College has gratefully relied on the giving of many friends—alumni, members of our sponsor Pacific Union, other supporters, students, and our employees on sacrificial wages. This is just as true today. These gifts really are our lifeline and sustain us day to day.

Initially, as the campus added buildings, the Pacific Union gave special appropriations and the college helped fund construction from student tuition. But about two decades ago much of that changed with the appropriations being used to help balance the general budget. At the same time, advancement professionals began to be trained to ask supporters to give annual gifts in addition to special gifts for endowments, scholarships, and projects. Recent campus buildings such as Clark Hall have been made possible by such gifts. All of these kinds of giving are essential for PUC's existence.

Because Adventists believe time is short, and some have preferred to see an immediate result from donations, giving to endowments wasn't a major part of the church's fundraising emphasis—until now. While we continue to need help for our annual fund and special projects, we realize how important an endowment is for our future. With an endowment, donated money is invested, with the principal always being maintained and only part of the interest being used annually.

Last summer John Collins, our vice president for finance, attended a presentation by Standard & Poor's analyzing the condition of American private higher education.<sup>1</sup> Their startling conclusion: The weakest portion of the sector is tuition dependent, under-endowed colleges capped by the ability to pay on the revenue side and rising costs on the other side.

Does this describe PUC and all Adventist colleges? Yes. About 83 percent of our revenue comes from tuition, while many non-Adventist private colleges may only get one-third of their revenue from tuition. PUC's endowment now is around \$18 million, with much of it in specific scholarships for students, academic departments, or faculty development, amounting to around \$9,000 per student; some

professional organizations recommend \$90,000 per student.\*

A recent issue of *The Chronicle of Higher Education* reported endowments for 765 colleges in the United States. We ranked #672 on the list. Those with endowments over \$1 billion increased an average of 15.2 percent in 2005, while those under \$25 million increased by only 7.8 percent.<sup>2</sup> The good news is that PUC's increased by 15.3 percent, illustrating that our funds are being well managed and growing through donations.

Our focus on creating a larger endowment through the creation of an Eco-Village is to ensure a growing future. Some see the financial challenges facing Adventist colleges as just another cycle; but the way private colleges are financed in America has completely changed with increased student scholarships, escalating costs such as those for technology and medical care for employees, the changing demographics of Adventism, and an aging physical plant. We also operate a town with all its associated costs. Employee salaries haven't kept up with inflation. Financial experts tell us the best way to create long-term stability is through endowments, which is how other strong American private colleges are growing.

We thank you for the generous gifts seen in this *Viewpoint*. Thanks for continuing to give to our annual fund and to assorted other needs, including various endowments we have judiciously invested.
