CONSECRATION

PASTOR KEVIN MORENO serves as senior pastor of Green Bay Seventh-day Adventist Church in Wisconsin. He took this role after being the associate pastor for youth and young adults at the Green Bay Church, where he has served since 2020.

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BACCALAUREATE

PASTOR LAFFIT CORTES is a seasoned Seventh-day Adventist minister with over 25 years of experience, dedicated to a life of discipleship and service. Wherever he ministers, Pastor Cortes remains passionate about the Great Commission—making disciples of Jesus in every community he serves.

AIMEE (SAESIM) LEUKERT is a Southern California native who graduated from La Sierra University with degrees in music and liberal studies. She began her career at Crescenta Valley Adventist School, first as an elementary teacher, then as principal, returning to La Sierra to complete her master's degree in educational administration and leadership.

She pivoted to the secondary level when the opportunity arose to teach at her alma mater, Newbury Park Academy, followed by a call in 2010 for her and her husband, Kristian, to teach at Monterey Bay Academy, where they served for four years.

Then returning to Southern California, Dr. Leukert began working in La Sierra University's Center for Research on K-12 Adventist education. SIGNIFICANCE OF THE ACADEMIC BANNERS

The eight banners used in the graduation procession and displayed during the ceremony represent the college seal and the seven areas of study that are part of the college's legacy of academic offerings. Each banner incorporates either the torch or the book—elements of PUC's college seal. The colors and other symbols employed in each banner represent the academic fields.

- ~ APPLIED ARTS: *Symbols*—Torch and Symbol for Constructing
Colors—Maroon, Orange, and Green
- ~ FINE ARTS: *Symbols*—Torch and Spiral (symbolizing the golden mean)
Colors—Gold Yellow, Crimson, and White
- ~ HUMANITIES: *Symbols*—Book and Quill Pen
Colors—Light Blue and Citron
- ~ NATURAL SCIENCES: *Symbols*—Book and Symbol for the Four Elements
Colors—Green and Gold Yellow
- ~ PROFESSIONAL STUDIES: *Symbols*—Torch and Scroll
Colors—Burnished Gold, Silver Gray, and Apricot
- ~ RELIGION: *Symbols*—Cross and Book
Colors—Scarlet and Purple
- ~ SOCIAL SCIENCES: *Symbols*—Torch and Globe

SIGNIFICANCE OF ACADEMIC REGALIA

Caps and gowns worn in formal academic convocations in American colleges and universities are the descendants of the everyday attire worn in the universities of medieval Europe.

Three basic types of gowns are worn: bachelor's gowns have long, pointed sleeves; master's gowns have long, closed sleeves; and doctorate gowns have full sleeves with velvet bars. The bars may be black to indicate any doctoral degree, or the color of the particular degree, e.g., dark blue for Doctor of Philosophy.

The part of the regalia that tells the most about the degree is the hood. Hoods for master's degrees are lined with satin in the colors of the academic institution conferring the degree. The edging or trim of the hood is a wide velvet band, the color of which indicates the academic area in which the degree is earned. The wide, velvet edging of the doctoral hood indicates the particular kind of degree held, e.g., dark blue for Ph.D., light blue for Ed.D., and green for M.D.. The length of the hood reflects the level of the degree represented.

Some universities include stoles specific to their university. PUC graduates have the option of adding the college's stole or stoles representing their cultural heritage, status as a first-generation college graduate, or status in the U.S. military to their regalia. PUC's stole is green with the college's seal in gold. Graduates who have participated in the Adventist Colleges Abroad and PUC World Missions programs wear white and light gray stoles, respectively, with the flag of each country in which they studied or served, while members of the National Society of Leadership & Success may wear platinum stoles with black embroidery.

The mortarboard or beret is worn with all degrees. The tassel should be black or the color appropriate to the subject, with the exception of the doctor's cap that may have a tassel of gold.

SIGNIFICANCE OF THE NURSING PIN

Florence Nightingale is the first nurse known to have been presented with a professional nursing pin, awarded by Queen Victoria for her outstanding patient care to soldiers during the Crimean War.

The Associate of Science graduates' pin is in the form of a Greek cross, which has become a symbol of unselfish nursing service given with professional knowledge and skill. The lamp in the center of the pin symbolizes the relief of suffering by nurses who give love, care, and healing.

The Bachelor of Science graduates' pin has three circles surrounded by a laurel wreath. Within the inner circle is a flaming torch denoting Christ as the light of the world, and an open book which represents the book of life and the wisdom of the scriptures. The next circle contains the motto of the college, "They shall be all taught of God," and the outer circle identifies the college name, Pacific Union College. The wreath signifies the achievement of the victors of the baccalaureate nursing program.

SEATING

There is an open seating plan for all weekend events. No more than one row (up to 14 seats) per graduate may be reserved. A person must be present and remain present to reserve seats. Seats may not be held past 11:05 a.m. for Baccalaureate; seats for Commencement may be held from 7:00 a.m. until 8:45 a.m. when all seats become available for the general audience.

PARKING

Plan to arrive at least an hour early to Commencement to find parking and get seated. Guests can park on the main campus. Campus parking lots will be closed as they become full. CEREMONY ETIQUETTE

Service dogs accompanying their designated person are the only animals allowed on campus. Emotional support animals and pets are not allowed onsite. Air horns and confetti bombs will be confiscated by event staff and held at the Information Booth for guests to pick up after the ceremony.

ABOUT MAXWELL COMMONS

D. Malcolm Maxwell was the nineteenth president of PUC and the first alumnus to serve in that role. He had the longest tenure—18 years—of any president of the college. Maxwell passed away in 2007, but his legacy and impact on PUC continue to live on. He is remembered for his energy, passion, and commitment to higher education, and it is in this spirit Maxwell Commons was named.

THE HISTORY OF THROWING TORTILLAS

The tradition of throwing tortillas at graduation began in the mid- to late-90s during Pacific Union College's graduation in Commencement Grove. Beach balls and confetti poppers were a time-honored tradition, but then tortilla tossing was introduced. Due to its novelty, it quickly gained popularity, and slowly the other traditions (i.e., beach balls and poppers) faded.

The tortilla-throwing tradition possibly began at Bay to Breakers, the annual footrace in San Francisco. No one really knows when it started, but for decades now, thousands of people have gathered at the starting line and tossed tortillas in the air before the official race begins.

EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR

NICOLETTE PIAUBERT, FNP, B.A., RN

A dedicated Family Nurse Practitioner, published author, and dynamic nursing professor, Nicolette Piaubert exemplifies excellence in nursing education. As a faculty member, she teaches foundational and advanced courses, equipping students with the clinical knowledge and critical thinking needed to succeed in the profession. Her impact extends nationally as an ATI Nurse Educator, where she leads multi-day NCLEX prep courses and empowers students with effective test strategies and clinical insights.

Professor Piaubert holds degrees from SUNY Albany, Atlantic Union College, and Pace University, and is currently pursuing her doctorate at Liberty University. Also active as a Pathfinder Club director and mission volunteer, she is the author of four books, including "The Light We Are," a devotional for nursing students.

PROFESSORS EMERITI

ROBERT PAULSON, PH.D.

Since 1981, Dr. Robert Paulson, known to many as "Bob," has served the Adventist church as an educator. Dr. Paulson served in the department of kinesiology for 30 years (1994-2024). During that time, he developed and maintained a thriving intramurals program.

Dr. Paulson served on the Curriculum and Efficiency Committee for many years, including nearly a decade as chair. For several years before his retirement, he served as the chair of the department of kinesiology.

Passionate about innovation, Dr. Paulson pioneered an online jogging course and fostered collaboration across North American Adventist higher education institutions. He also championed collaborative education through his work with the Adventist Virtual Learning Network and CAREOnline (Consortium of Adventist Higher Education Online).

Dr. Paulson has been a coach, teacher, mentor, and colleague for several generations, and his legacy ties thousands of people together.


ROBIN VANCE, PH.D.
